34th Annual General Assembly





Caritas Nepal (CN) held its 34th Annual General Meeting (AGM) on September 03, 2023. The meeting gathered esteemed board members and the executive committee, emphasizing CN's commitment to serve the extremely poor and vulnerable communities without discrimination as part of the Catholic Church's mission. Sr Cecilia Durga Shrestha, the Executive Director, expressed her appreciation to the Executive Committee and General Body for their steadfast support.

During the AGM, General Secretary Mr. Chirendra Satyal presented the minutes from the 33rd AGM which were approved by Treasurer Mr. Ganesh Prashad Parajuli and General Body Member. The General Programme Manager delivered the fiscal year BS. 2079/80 report, revealing CN's impact through 18 projects reaching 43,408 HHs nationwide.

Senior Finance Manager, Mr. Indra Bahadur Nepali, reviewed the audit report, covering financial income, expenditure and the proposed budget for the upcoming year. The financial report and budget proposal were approved with the support of Secretary Mr. Chirendra Satyal and General Body Member Mr. Charles William Mendis.

Nepal Livelihoods and Resilience Program

Phase 2

July 2023- June 2028




Illam, Jhapa, Lalitpur, Kaski, Nawalpur, Banke, Bardiya, Surkhet, Dailkeh and Kanchapur

Nepal Livelihoods and Resilience Program Phase II (NLRP II), aims to enhance the social well-being and resilience of vulnerable farming households and communities. Supported by Australian Aid and Caritas Australia, the project focuses on improving food security for smallholder farmers through homestead production, enhancing resilience to climate change, increasing profitability for enterprise farmers, expanding economic development services through local cooperatives, strengthening social protection systems, and promoting basic child rights.

Implemented in ten locations across six provinces of Nepal from July 2023 to June 2028, the target group includes women, children, people with disabilities, janjati communities and Dalits.









- 921 farmers (738 women) have been trained in homestead kitchen garden management and climate change, and have received input support. On average, these farmers have adapted 4 out of the 11 climateadaptive practices promoted through the homestead and Farmer's Field School approaches.
- 300 smallholder farmers (197 women) engaged in vegetable, banana, goat, coffee, pig, honeybee, and homestay sectors received enterprise and technical training with input and grant support. During the first year of the project, 96 vegetable farmers successfully produced a total of 248,679 kg of vegetables from 40.4 hectares of land. More than 50% of the production was sold in the market.
- **546 farmers** are accessing digital services for technical advisory, weather updates, and market information through Geo Krishi.
- 10 cooperatives received training in cooperative management, resulting in a 15% increase in membership (575 new members) this year, bringing the total to 4,315. Out of the total members, 70% are women and 2% are people with disabilities.
- 10 help desks have been established in 10 cooperatives. These help
 desks handled 25 cases involving various disputes, including family
 disputes, land disputes, child marriage, and gender-based violence. 3
 cases were referred for further action, while 12 common arguments and
 disagreements have been resolved at the community level.
- 10 child clubs were reformed, benefiting 1737 children. This initiative
 has provided this children with a platform for growth, development and
 active participation in their surroundings.

Food Security and Resilience Project-Khatyad

January 2023- December 2025



Food Security and Resilience Project - Khatayad aims to enhance food security and improve the nutritional status of 650 marginalized Smallholder Farmer Households (SHFHs) in three wards of Khatyad Rural Municipality, Mugu District in Karnali Province. The project will focus on increasing food security of these communities by at least 1 to 1.5 months through diverse agroecological practices. Additionally, it will also collaborate closely with the local government to develop agroecological plans that are tailored to the specific needs of each community.









- 515 farmers have initiated diversified vegetable gardens.
 Out of these, 250 farmers have started systematic vegetable cultivation with more than 6 varieties of vegetables in a year.
 Additionally, 400 farmers have added 2 or more fruit trees, such as walnut, lemon and apple to their garden.
- 273 farmers (234 women) are practicing various agro ecological methods, promoting locally available resources and seeds. They are using botanical pesticides made from locally available botanicals, which has helped them reduce their dependency on external chemical pesticides.
- 2 learning centers have been established to engage the community through farmer gatherings, discussions, and training on agroecological practices like mulching, vegetable diversification, local seed production and preservation. These centers also serve as collective nurseries for producing vegetable seedlings.
- 400 farmers have started cultivating different forgotten crops such as millet, buckwheat, chino, local beans. Likewise, a seed preservation unit has been set up at the district office in Khatyad, with over 20 varieties of local seeds for different crops and vegetables.

SAFBIN Nepal-Climate Resilient Agriculture System for Smallholder Farmers in Nepal (CRASS)



January 2023- December 2025



SAFBIN Nepal "Climate Resilient Agriculture System for Smallholder Farmers in Nepal" (CRASS) is the project that aims to enhance food security for 1,800 marginalized Smallholder Farmers (SHFs) and build climate and disaster-resilient communities across six wards in four rural municipalities of Nawalparasi district.

The project will follow the Smallholder Farmers Collectives (SHFCs) lead approach and empower the communities through regenerative agriculture by promoting climate-resilient practices, providing input support, conducting farmer-led On-farm Action Research (OFAR), and fostering multi-







- 1,800 HHs have established diversified kitchen gardens, each cultivating 8-10 different vegetables. Over 35% of smallholder farmers have well-organized kitchen gardens, and more than 20% are selling their surplus vegetables in local markets. Additionally, over 50% of these farmers have reduced their use of chemical pesticides.
- 180 lead farmers (145 women) were identified by their peers, fostering a sense of trust and familiarity among fellow farmers. These lead farmers were then trained to mobilize their communities and access government schemes, inputs, and financial services.
- 2 small irrigation schemes, measuring 700 meters and 75 meters respectively in length, have been constructed in two ward in collaboration with the local governments and communities. These improvements have provided additional irrigation to over 45 hectares of land, benefiting more than 475 households.
- 6 learning centers have been established across each ward, providing farmers with a space to gather as per need and learn about various climate-resilient regenerative agriculture practices. These practices include the use of locally available resources for botanical pesticides, vermicompost, improved cow shed management etc.
- 312 farmers have been trained and capacitated to conduct on farm action research on various climate-adaptive practices.
- A Local Disaster and Climate Resilience Plan (LDCRP) has been developed in collaboration with Madhyabindu Municipality. This plan will help and assist the local government in addressing the impacts of disasters and climate change on communities and offer strategies for mitigating these effects.

Ginger Storage and Warehouse Receipt Funding Project

October 2023-September 2024



The innovative concept of "Ginger Storage and Warehouse Receipt Funding" is a pilot project designed to revolutionize ginger farming in Tansen Municipality of Palpa district. Through this project, Caritas Nepal aims to empower ginger farmers by enabling off-season sales, ensuring safe storage, and providing loans backed by stored ginger as collateral through the cooperative.

- Guidelines have been developed for agro product storage house management in collaboration with municipalities and cooperatives, ensuring adherence to standards, regulations and principles.
- 200 ginger farmers are capacitated on good agriculture practices on ginger, plant
 protection, bio pesticide preparation, bruni harvesting, post-harvest management,
 etc. Likewise, market linkage workshops has helped ginger farmers connect with
 potential buyers.
- 5 individual representing warehouse management teams and cooperative staff gained hands-on learning experience through exposure visits. As a result, the management team has successfully stored approximately 4,900 kilograms of ginger in a warehouse, benefiting 39 ginger farmers.
- 13 farmers were able to receive the loans against ginger as collateral. The local cooperative has allocated a total of NPR 116,000 at a 12% interest rate. Farmers can repay the loan when the market price of ginger is more favorable.







Reducing Ginger Storage Losses with Women Producers in Nepal

February 2024 to April 2026



Caritas Nepal, in partnership with CRS, has recently started a research project to address the challenges faced by ginger producers in Nepal's mid-hills in adopting effective storage practices. The project aims to promote three community-level storage technologies, installing them in 300 households in two years period of time. Through these low-cost, zero-energy storage solutions, the project seeks to reduce ginger storage losses, improve nutrition security, and improve income of women farmers. The project is funded by Purdue University, Tufts University and USAID.

- An inception and interaction workshop was conducted in Palpa and Pyuthan districts, gathering all relevant stakeholders to present and discuss about the project.
- 20 brick-molding machines have been provided to farmers to help them manufacture the necessary bricks for constructing storage facilities. Additionally, IEC materials have been published in 4 types of household level ginger storage morality.

Meena (Name changed) was trafficked to Lebanon(name of the country changed) to work as a domestic helper by a local agent from Nepal. In Lebanon, she was wrongfully accused of causing the death of her employer's son. Fearing for her safety, she fled and sought refuge with another Nepali migrant for several months.

A volunteer from the migration project identified her case through her family and documented through project's help desk. With the persistent efforts and coordination with the Nepal Embassy in Lebanon and likeminded organizations from Nepal, she was able to return to Nepal. Upon her return, she was ill, lacked shelter, and had no means to support herself and her two children.

The project team intervened to provide her with immediate shelter, medical care, and essential necessities. Jhapa rural municipality provided her shelter. Additionally, Caritas Nepal assisted in rebuilding her livelihood by providing livestock (a cow and piglets).

Meena is now happily reunited with her family and remains optimistic about her future.





Promoting Safe Migration and Preventing Trafficking in Person

Oct 2022 to Sep 2025

Combating Trafficking through Safe Migration

Feb 2024 to Jan 2027



The project aligns with Caritas Nepal strategic objective 2 aimed to empower individual rights by addressing unsafe migration and raising risk awareness. Focusing on Koshi Province, a region known for its high rates of labor migration and reliance on remittances, the project address socio-economic challenges faced by the migrant workers and their families. By collaborating with local governments, educational institutions and community groups, the project aims to enhance the capacity of stakeholders to prevent, protect and support migrant workers, their families, potential migrants, returnees and survivors of human trafficking.



- 56 migrant returnees (15 women) received tailored start-up support to help them launch small businesses and restore their livelihoods. They were also capaciated with 3-days training on business plan development, market management and value chain.
- 8 returnee migrants (2 women) received psychosocial, and medical support. Additionally, 8 returnee migrants (3 women) received legal assistance through a referral mechanism in coordination with the Embassy of Nepal in Oman and Kuwait and like minded organizations. Notably, 3 women were rescued and successfully reintegrated with their families.
- 145 (55 women) individuals, including returnee migrants, potential migrants, migrant family members and survivors of trafficking, received vocational training based on the CTEVT curriculum. This training helped returnees to restart their life with dignity.
- The inter-faith dialogue event was organised on safe migration and trafficking in person in Jhapa Rural Municipality, Ward No. 6 with 326 participants. Religious leaders from Hindu, Muslim and Christian communities shared insights and raised awareness, strengthening the collective commitment to combat these issues.



Ensuring Safe Migration and Promoting Sustainable Local Reintegration

Dec 2022 to Nov 2023



- 324 community members have been oriented on Nepal Government's foreign employment policies, programs and ethical recruitment practices.
- 2 groups of 50 migrant family members have been capacitated through Integrated Pest Management (IPM) training under the campaign "Agriculture Calling". These groups received grant support of NPR 250,000 each from Kankai Municipality to continue their community farming initiatives.








EMPOWERING WOMEN FOR SOCIAL WELL-BEING & SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE PROJECT (SDI)

April 2022 to March 2025



The 'Empowering Women for Social Well-being and Sustainable Agriculture' project is being implemented in four districts of Nepal. The project focuses on empowering marginalized women through a people-led development approach. It emphasizes agroecological approaches and food sovereignty, to achieve locally-driven social and economic goals. The project fosters community empowerment through regular discussions and collective decision-making, helping communities assert their rights, drive social change, and address discrimination. By preserving local knowledge and resources, it strengthens traditional practices and promotes sustainable agriculture and social well-being through action-reflection cycles and collective ownership.





- 11 women's groups have been actively advocating for social and ecological justice, addressing 83 issues related to gender-based violence, polygamy, alcoholism, high use of pesticides in agriculture and its effect in ecology.
- In the last fiscal year, nine cooperatives collected NPR 2,443,971 in member savings and mobilized NPR 6,286,480 in loans for 293 women. Approximately 92% of the loans were used for income-generating activities, including 24% for agriculture, 51% for livestock, and 17% for small enterprise development.
- 5 cooperatives in Kapilvastu, Palpa, and Makwanpur districts have cultivated 0.6 hectares of land with black soybeans, potatoes, sweet potatoes, and turmeric, yielding 3.5 tons through agroecological practices.
- **87 new farmers** have started adapting integrated farming practices that combines agriculture, livestock, and poultry.
- 80 diversified kitchen gardens have been established to support women's group with healthy, safe, and nutritious food.
- 2 local seed exchange events were held between women's group members in Makwanpur district. 53 participants attended and 21 varieties of local seeds were displayed and exchanged. This will help them conserve local traditional seeds.



Health Camp Services and Disabled Family Support

Dec 2023- Nov 2024



The project aims to enhance access to basic individual health diagnostics through health camps, including eye screening, general, and gynecological health checks. Vulnerable individuals will be referred for further medical treatment. Additionally, the project will provide 20 households with disabilities with rural enterprise development training and grant support. Beneficiaries can use this grant to implement income-generating activities based on their business plans.





- 20 people with disabilities have been provided with business development training and grant support.
- 1,863 patients (1,243 women) were screened, with the following breakdown by speciality: General Medicine (166), Orthopedics (329), Gynecology (198), Ophthalmology (302), Surgery (43), ENT (111), Dental (139), Pediatrics (112), Ultrasound (200), ECG (95) and Laboratory (168).



Resilient Community Health Project

Dec 2020- Nov 2023

The Resilient Community Health project focuses on strengthening community resilience by upgrading rural health facilities and equipping health workers with the necessary training. The project also emphasizes on disaster preparedness and risk reduction to enhance overall resilience. Additionally, the project provides grant support and specialized trainings to individuals and families with disabilities



- 91 individuals representing health post personnel and FCHVs, have been trained in mental health management, basic life support, ambulance-based case management, comprehensive family planning, reproductive health, and HIV/AIDS transmission.
- 2,694 people have been screened through free eye and dental care services. Among those screened, 32 people received tooth extractions, and 67 students received glasses through referral support for refractive errors.
- 2,847 patients were screened through health camp, with nearly 400 needing further care. Services included ultrasounds, ECGs, eye care, and surgery. Medicine and other support were provided to all the patients.
- 107 community volunteers were trained on basic health service and first aid .A task force was established under the leadership of the Local Disaster Management Committee (LDMC) for effective communication and coordination.

School Based Disaster Risk Reduction Program

December 2022 - November 2025



School-Based Disaster Risk Reduction (S-DRR) project aims to implement a comprehensive and integrated program that enhances the resilience of schools, local institutions, and communities against floods and other hazards. The project focuses on preparing for future disasters by developing and implementing effective preparedness plans. The overall goal is to create safer schools and more resilient rural communities.





- 932 students from 9 schools have received training on personal and menstrual hygiene, leading to increased awareness among the students.
- 9 comprehensive school safety action plans have been developed, with the participation of 383 individuals in Vulnerability and Capacity Assessments (VCA). These plans aim to enhance disaster preparedness through effective planning and implementation.
- 4 school toilets were rehabilitated and 4 safe drinking water systems were installed, benefiting 1,271 students and improving access to Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) facilities.
- 600 saplings of various species were planted across 20 community schools, 7 primary health centers and 2 public places. This initiative has effectively promoted environmental education and enhanced disaster resilience.
- **3 mitigation activities**, including compound wall construction and playground filling and levelling were carried out, benefiting 1200 students and teachers by improving school safety.
- 179 (82 women) community people and students residing in Jhapa RM 1 and 2(top-ranked region in the district for monsooninduced disasters, as mapped by NDRRMA) participated in the flood and inundation awareness-raising sessions organized by Caritas Nepal in coordination with the Armed Police Force, BOP, Tagandubba.

Unifying Together for Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster Preparedness in Nepal (UTHAN)

December 2023 - December 2026

Unifying together for Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster Preparedness in Nepal project aims to strengthen disaster resilience in Sinja and Tilagufa municipalities of Jumla and Kalikot districts through comprehensive risk management and capacity-building initiatives. The project emphasizes safe construction practices, risk reduction, and mitigation strategies, while raising community awareness. Additionally, it supports economic and livelihood resilience by constructing safe shelters and creating demonstration models for community education.

- 7 Ward Disaster Management Committees (WDMCs), 30 Community Disaster Management Committees (CDMCs), 7 Child Clubs and 7 Youth Clubs have been established by the project, engaging 1,200 members in disaster preparedness and community resilience activities. These members have actively led discussions and identified disaster risks, implemented mitigation activities, and prepared for earthquakes through initiatives such as gabion box construction, plantation efforts and earthquake simulations.
- 1,050 saplings have been planted by the community and child club members in disaster-prone areas, in collaboration with local government to promote disaster risk reduction and raise awareness about climate change adaptation.
- 27 youth members are engaged in the income-generating activities, such as mushroom cultivation and vegetable farming, supporting financial stability and encouraging sustainable agricultural practices.
- **146 people** representing Local Disaster Management Committees (LDMCs) and community members received earthquake preparedness simulations and risk assessment training enhancing their disaster response skills.





Earthquake Response & Early Recovery Program



Earthquake Response and Early Recovery program is designed to support earthquakeaffected families in Jajarkot and Rukum West districts, helping them recover and lead dignified lives. The project focuses on emergency relief and recovery, providing essential food, Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) services, and non-food items. It also includes the construction of transitional shelters and temporary learning centers. Additionally, the program offers socio-technical and psychosocial support to enhance community well-being, undertakes infrastructure development by restoring water schemes, and raises public awareness on safe construction practices and earthquake preparedness.





- 1,500 HHs received food and WASH items, while 1,518 children (ages 0-12) received warm clothing and 484 lactating mothers were provided with nutritious food.
- 500 HHs received temporary shelters equipped with toilets. 14 temporary learning centers were established, ensuring safe and dignified living conditions and educational facilities for students. Additionally, 1,976 HHs received socio-technical support for constructing transitional shelters, enhancing their resilience and safety.
- 1,149 children and 469 community members received psycho-social services to address their mental health and emotional well-being needs.
- 165 individuals were trained as masons, provided with homeowners' construction guidebooks, and oriented on Gender Equality, Disability, and Social Inclusion (GEDSI) and safeguarding practices.
- 10 water schemes were restored, improving access to clean and safe water for the community.

National Housing and Settlements
Resilience Platform (NHSRP) is
a consortium of organizations
collaborating with the government
on Disaster Risk Reduction and
Management, with a focus on
housing. The platform enhances
information systems, disaster
preparedness, and capacity
building. Caritas Nepal contributes
by building capacity in Koshi
Province, where a team is embedded
within the provincial government to
provide technical support.



- Stakeholders from 38 palikas of 14 districts have been oriented on NDRRMA's procedures for housing reconstruction following monsoon and fire-induced disasters. The session provided insights into the Reconstruction Management Information System (RMIS), BIPAD Apps, technical inspection processes, and related procedures.
- 80 palikas in Koshi Province received training on BIPAD portal localization and were supported to create user IDs and passwords of the portal.
- Caritas Nepal, in coordination with the NHSRP, conducted a Knowledge, Attitudes, and Practice (KAP) housing assessment in Budiganga Rural Municipality, Morang district, Koshi Province, focusing on the Janata Awas Housing and Surakchhit Nagarik Awas programs. 1,629 households were surveyed.
- 1,629 HHs were registered in the BIPAD portal. Out of the total HHs, 62 HHs have completed reconstruction and received all tranches. Additionally, 125 HHs have received the second installment, and 539 HHs have received the first tranche.




